

My Furry Valentine is pleased to welcome you to our 8th Annual Mega Pet Adoption Event!

Whether you are here to adopt a furry companion, help out at a booth, or support the cause and get your daily fix of adorable animals, the volunteer My Furry Valentine Team behind the scenes is thankful for each and every one of you.

Since its inception in 2012, My Furry Valentine has grown to become one of the largest animal adoption events in the country! Last February we welcomed over **15,000 visitors**, recorded **966 adoptions** and reached an exciting milestone of over **5,000 animals** adopted to date!

These numbers speak to the impact you make by attending our event today in support of animal adoption. You're helping us rewrite the script for all homeless animals.

My Furry Valentine is committed to a world without pet shelter euthanasia. We look toward a future that doesn't require mega pet adoption events. But until this goal is realized we will continue our efforts to educate the community about the importance of adoption, and connect animals in need of a home with people willing to give them one.

- Each year 6.5 million animals enter shelters nationwide, hoping to catch the eye of one of a potenial adopter. Many Americans still get their pets from places other than rescues and shelters, yet statistics reveal that there are over 10 times as many people looking to bring an animal into their home every year as there are animals being killed in shelters because they lack one.
- An average of 4,100 cats and dogs per day are euthanized in shelters across the United States, making euthanasia the **leading cause of untimely death** for healthy dogs and cats in our country.
- If just 1 out of every 10 people getting a new cat or dog were to adopt from a shelter or rescue, not one single healthy cat or dog would lose their life in a shelter. You can be that one in ten!

Joining forces with our rescue, shelter and other animal welfare event partners is critical to My Furry Valentine's success – and the health of the adopted pets. By implementing spay/neuter, foster care and networks, trap-neuter-return, pet retention and other comprehensive adoption programs, we work toward the ultimate goal of becoming a "no kill" nation.

EVENT RULES & GENERAL INFORMATION

There has never been a better time to adopt!

My Furry Valentine is Greater Cincinnati's annual mega adoption event – so find your Valentine and get ready to snuggle up! We are proud and honored to present nearly 1,000 adoptable animals this weekend. There are puppies, dogs, cats, kittens and other small animals.

Be sure to explore every corner of the Sharonville Convention Center and each group of adoptable animals. Keep in mind that each group has their own adoption policies, applications and fees.

FOR YOUR PROTECTION AND THE SAFETY OF THE ANIMALS:

- Keep children supervised at all times.
- · Do not poke your hands or fingers through cages.
- Please ask before approaching and petting any dog on a leash.
- Please do not offer any food or treats to any animal.
- Ask for assistance if you would like to interact with an animal out of its cage.
- Wash your hands before and after handling puppies to prevent the spread of dangerous germs from animal to animal. Hand sanitizer is readily available throughout the convention center.
- Only adoptable animals from our participating shelters and rescues are allowed in the building. Please do not bring your own animals on premises.
- If you did bring your animal today, we kindly ask that for their own safety, you return them home or have someone pick them up. We will call the police for any instances of an animal left in a vehicle.

INFORMATION FOR POTENTIAL ADOPTERS

ANIMALS ON SITE

All the animals you see here today are offered for adoption through one of our reputable shelter or rescue partners. (If you'd like to learn a bit more about the difference between the two, please read our overview on the next page). These animals have come from both near and far, and from all different situations and circumstances. They each have their own individual story and we encourage you to meet many of them and talk to the booth representatives about them to help you find the perfect match. All animals are current on age-appropriate vaccinations, have been spayed or neutered,

and were vet-checked this morning upon entering the facility.

SAME-DAY ADOPTIONS

Animal shelters and many rescue groups will review applications on-site and allow an animal to be adopted and go home the same day to an approved adopter. Others take a bit more time to do a home visit as part of their screening process, in order to ensure they are finding just the right match for you and their animals. Groups that offer "same-day" adoptions are designated in red on the map and with a red booth at the event.



ADOPTION SUBSIDIES

Thanks to our Cool Cat Sponsor, TEN, we are offering reduced adoption fees for cats and kittens through participating groups, as indicated on the map by a paw print. Fees for kittens adopted from these groups are just \$25 and \$10 for cats.

RESCUES & SHELTERS - WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

ANIMAL SHELTERS

Open Admission/Public Shelters

Open admission shelters take in any animal in need regardless of age, health issues, breed or temperament – factors that could make an animal difficult to adopt. It is generally the public, or county-operated shelters, that are open admission, as they are established to serve members of their community. Shelters receive government-funding at various levels, but many still struggle to make ends meet to support operations and provide basic animal care. Therefore shelters often supplement income with public donations.

These shelters do not turn away an animal in need, so can quickly become overcrowded when they cannot find homes for their animals fast enough to keep cage space available. Many of these shelters also serve as animal control agencies. As such, they are contracted to respond to calls reporting animal neglect or abuse, and to pick up strays – adding another source of animals coming into the shelter. All of these obligations tend to keep the pipeline of animals full at an open-admission shelter. For these reasons, open admission shelters in our country have *historically* been forced to euthanize animals in certain situations: those that require expensive medical treatment, or animals who aren't adopted within a certain period of time. Even ealthy, adoptable animals are sometimes euthanized to free cage space for new arrivals – and, sadly, there are always new arrivals.

Thankfully, there is a national movement taking hold, for open admission shelters to also operate on a "No-Kill" philosophy. This means shelters do not euthanize for space, typically save at least 90% of the animals in their care. To accomplish this, they need volunteers, fosters and community partners to achieve their mission.

Of note — although open-admission shelters have little control over the mix of animals coming into their facility, it is estimated that across the nation as many as 25% of dogs, and many cats, can be purebreds. The notion that you cannot adopt a purebred animal is a myth.



Private shelters that receive no government funding can be more selective about the animals they take in. Because there is no mandate to accept animals, they can control their population through limited admission, admitting only the number of animals that they can accommodate.

Because their primary mission is to save as many lives as possible, they generally take in animals they know will quickly find a home. This is to help ensure that finite shelter space is freed up for the next arrivals. Many times, animals in these shelters are pulled from the euthanasia lists of open admission shelters. Adoption fees are generally higher than at public shelters, reflecting the more selective intake processes and individual care they can provide to their animals.

PRIVATE RESCUE GROUPS

Rescue groups are generally private, 501(c)(3) charitable organizations, that are foster-based without a brick-and-mortar facility. They do not receive government funding, so must rely on volunteers and the kindness and generosity of the community for donations of time and money. If they are a registered 501(c)(3), donations are tax-deductible, they have a Board of Directors that provides oversight, and they file annual 990 tax returns that publicly show details of their financial status. There are many variations of private rescue groups to choose from, so it is important to do your research, look at GuideStar, check references, and take your time in choosing well.

- General Rescue Groups These groups are devoted to saving the lives of dogs or cats in need, without regard to breed or type.
- Breed-Specific Rescues breed rescues take in only a specific breed, (i.e., Labradors, Pit Bulls, Schnauzers, Boxers, etc.). If you are looking for a specific breed, this is a good place to start. These groups can give expert advice to potential adopters on breed characteristics, genetic tendencies, the amount of daily activity required, and other factors that help to determine if this breed is a good match to your family and lifestyle.
- Specialized Rescues These are dedicated to a specific cause, such as saving older animals, or pregnant or nursing mothers.

Rescue groups are unique because most of them will provide for an animal's medical needs before listing it for adoption. This can include major surgeries, on-going treatment for chronic (but manageable) conditions, and acute injuries. Broken legs are considered an acute injury, and these often may be handled with euthanasia in an open-admission shelter, due to their inability to spend public dollars on individual animal needs.

Rescue/shelter partnerships are the key to saving animals in situations like these. Adoption fees tend to be higher at rescues than shelters because rescues provide this extra level of care when it's needed. And whatever part of an adoption fee is not spent on one animal is spent on the next.



NEW ADOPTER INSTRUCTION MANUAL

So, you've adopted your new family member and are ready to head home! What's next? The first few days in your home are special and critical for your new pet. They will likely be confused about where they are and what to expect from you.

Here are some important things to keep in mind to help them acclimate to their new surroundings:

- Plan to visit your vet within a few days of bringing home your new pet. A thorough evaluation lets your vet get to know your animal and vaccinate as needed, and you'll get a thorough health evaluation. If your pet is not microchipped, now is the time to do so. We have many great vets on site this weekend in the vendor room. Feel free to talk to them and ask questions about caring for your new pet.
- If you are switching your new pet's food, plan to do it slowly over several days. Because abrupt changes to your dog's or cat's diet can cause stomach issues, slowly mix the new food with the food the rescue or shelter has been feeding. While you're here, be sure to stop by and visit the pet food vendors participating at the event to learn more about their food and nutrition.
- Most importantly, give your new friend time to settle in! Remember that this is a stressful time for your new pet and things may not go as smoothly as you would hope these first few days, but be patient. It will take some time for your new pet to learn the house rules and understand a new routine. Give them time to decompress, use lots of positive reinforcement and let them know that they are loved unconditionally. It can take a few weeks for your animal to feel at home.

FOR DOGS:

- Give your dog time to acclimate to your home and family before introducing them to strangers. Make sure children know how to approach your dog without overwhelming them. For the first few days, limit too much excitement (such as the dog park or neighborhood children).
- Once home, take your dog to his toileting area immediately, and spend a good amount of time with him. This will help them get used to the area and relieve themselves. Coming into a new home with new people, new smells and new sounds can throw even the most housebroken dog off-track, so be prepared for some accidents.
- Determine where your dog will spend most of his time. Often a kitchen will work best for easy clean-up. Dog-proof the area during the first few months. This may mean taping loose electrical cords to baseboards; storing household chemicals on high

shelves; removing plants, rugs, and breakables, and

installing baby gates.

- Consider double-leashing your dog initially when on walks. Likewise, even in a fenced-in yard, it doesn't hurt to keep your dog leashed and graduate to having them drag a long leash until you know him better.
- Never leave your new dog alone in the yard, as they may be able to climb or jump a fence, and pay particular attention when entering/exiting a vehicle (and with opening doors).
- Introduce them to your existing pack on neutral territory. Walk dogs side-by-side a safe distance apart, letting them have the occasional sniff. Watch for signs of stress: stiff bodies, raised hair, intense staring, and bared teeth can all signal an impending tussle. If the walk goes well, allow the dogs to meet and explore in an enclosed area, like a neutral yard.



Once at home, beware of possible triggers such as food or toys. Remember that even people can be considered high-value in your pet's eyes. Consider feeding dogs separately – and limiting toys until you know better how your dogs will react.

- Consider crate-training your new dog. If done properly, crate-training creates a safe, secure place for your dog to decompress. If done properly, crate-training creates a safe, secure place for your dog to decompress. Leave the crate open so your dog can go in whenever they feel like it. It gives them a place to relax if they're tired or overwhelmed. Crate training also keeps your pet safe from eating things they shouldn't when you're not home. For effective crate-training, never use your dog's crate as punishment.
- Training your dog will start the first moment you have them. Take time to create a vocabulary list everyone will use when giving your dog directions. This will help prevent confusion and help your dog learn his commands. There are professional trainers at My Furry Valentine. Stop by their booths in the vendor room to pick up any literature they may have and talk to them about training your new pet.
- People often say they don't see their dog's true personality until several weeks after adoption. Be patient and understanding while also keeping to the schedule you intend to maintain for feeding, walks, etc. This schedule will show your dog what is expected of them, as well as what they can expect from you.

FOR CATS:

- To ease integration into your home, take into consideration where your cat came from. Were they staying in a cage, in a room, or in a foster home? Were there other cats living with them? Was the environment noisy or quiet? How often did they eat? Sleep? Changing all of these factors in the environment all at once can be very stressful. To integrate your new cat into your house and life as smoothly as possible, you must be able to recognize signs of stress while change the living situation slowly over time.
- Many cats are fearful when introduced to their new home; being moved from a small enclosure to an apartment or house is a big change. Your home also has different smells and noises than the shelter and/or the home where your cat lived before. Initially, confine your new cat to one room. Make sure that you provide your new cat with food, water, and a litter box, and that you regularly spend time in this room with them, so that they are not alone. After a few days, or once your cat is feeling comfortable, expand their access slowly to other parts of the house.



- Provide them with multiple hiding places. A cardboard box with holes cut in both sides and a blanket placed in the bottom can be a great hiding place. Be certain to provide her with hiding places on the ground, as well as up high. When she is in her hiding place, do not disturb her. Her hiding places should be her special places, where she can have privacy if desired.
- Place a scratching post or cat tree in their room. Place their scent on the cat tree by gently stroking their cheeks with a towel, and then rubbing the scratching post with the towel. This will transfer the scent onto the scratching post, thereby increasing the likelihood that your cat will use it.
- Give your cat time to adjust to their new home and family. **Do not force them** to stay near you, instead, coax them to you by playing with an interactive toy or staying near the food bowl while they are eating.
- Provide your cat with an **uncovered, clean litter box**. Covered litter boxes can trap odors inside the box, which is nice for you, but not for your cat. Cats are often quite fastidious; they are sensitive to smell so reducing the smell inside and around the litter box can be very important for them. Scoop out the litter box once daily, and completely empty it every two weeks. Clean it using a mild soap, and avoid using strong-smelling detergents or ammonia
- One of the big decisions cat owners must make is whether to allow their cat outside. There are many risks outdoors that can shorten your cat's life span. However, many cats really enjoy being outdoors and miss the stimulation of the natural world if they are kept inside all the time. There are several different ways that you can allow your cat to enjoy the outdoors without the risk – such as installing perches on windowsills. With patience, you can even teach your cat to walk with a harness or leash. For inside/outside decisions, we ask that you please abide by the commitments you made to the organization from which you adopted.






